# Free Two-Day Seminar and Showcase to Help Green Businesses

A free two-day event, showcasing cutting-edge environmental technologies and services, is being held in Bristol, on Monday 5 and Tuesday 6 June.

The event is being hosted at At-Bristol and is a must for:

One of the hot topics to be discussed at the event will be the new Waste and Electrical and Electronic Equipment (WEEE) Directive. This aims to prevent waste electrical and electronic equipment arising, encourage reuse, recycling and recovery of WEEE, and improve environmental performance of all operators involved in lifecycle of WEEE. Awareness about the new directive is being further highlighted by the arrival of the RSA WEEE Man sculpture on Bristol's Harbourside on 15 May.

Councillor Gary Hopkins, Executive member for Sustainable Environments and Neighbourhoods, Bristol City Council said,

'Bristol is the perfect setting to showcase the latest environmental technologies and services. This event will illustrate the huge business opportunity that has opened up by the need for becoming sustainable. As well as the environmental industries, businesses and industry from across all sectors should benefit from the seminar programme and showcase event, by finding out how they can improve resource efficiency and comply with legislation.'

As well as hosting the two-day business seminar and showcase on 5 and 6 June, RSA WEEE Man will also host 'Sustainable Bristol' a two-day festival over the weekend of 3 and 4 June. This event is aimed at the public, to encourage more of us to do our bit to conserve the planet's natural resources.   initiative aimed at changing attitudes and behaviour to the disposal of
  waste electrical and electronic equipment.
- The RSA WEEE Man project was developed and managed by Rob Holdway, Giraffe Innovation Limited, based on an original idea conceived by Hugh Knowles and developed in partnership with Mark Fremantle, both Fellows of the RSA. The RSA WEEE Man has been designed by Paul Bonomini and was produced by Stage One.
- The RSA is an ideas exchange for the 21st Century. Drawing on an influential network of leaders from every field and background, the RSA confronts the complex issues facing today's world with initiatives effecting real and lasting change.
- The WEEE Directive: aims to prevent waste electrical and electronic equipment arising, encourage reuse, recycling and recovery of WEEE, and improve environmental performance of all operators involved in lifecycle of WEEE. Producers will be responsible for financing more of these activities; retailers/distributors have responsibilities in terms of take-back of WEEE. Likely to come into force in 2007.
