Help save the planet by visiting Sustainable Bristol – the city's biggest-ever 'green' festival

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The amazing RSA WEEE man – a seven metre tall, 3.3 tonnes giant robotic figure made from old televisions, mobile phones and washing machines – will open to the public on Monday 15 May 2006.

The city's biggest-ever planet-friendly festival, is taking place in Waterfront Square and Millennium Square, over the weekend of Saturday 3 and Sunday 4 June.

Celebrating the *Bristol Festival of Nature*, the event aims to inform visitors about the environment and explore important issues around sustainable living. Experts will be on hand to encourage individuals to swap their wasteful habits for better ones, like recycling more and using our cars less.

The event has been organised by Bristol City Council, the Bristol Natural History Consortium and a wide range of partner organisations.

The weekend's programme includes:

- Waste Smash Watch in amazement as the Sofa Project Team tear
 apart household electrical waste such as cookers, washing machines,
 and fridges to demonstrate what can be recycled and the amount of
 environmentally damaging waste contained in these everyday items
- Big Recycling Roadshow Come and meet the Waste Team from Bristol City Council to learn about the 3 R's – Reduce, Reuse and Recycle. You can take part in a recycling challenge and pick up some great recycled freebies!
- Children's Scrapstore Roadshow Try out your artistic talents by making junk models and crazy creations from bits and bobs of safe waste supplied by the Children's Scrapstore.

- Weapons of Sound This group of musicians make music on recycled junk. Get along to one of their workshops where you can build your own musical instrument from waste and then take part in a musical extravaganza.
- Bordeaux Quay & Quartier Vert A local restaurant and cookery school will be inviting everyone to experience what a Sustainable Kitchen tastes like. Resident chefs will look at issues from reducing the amount of packaging on the food we buy, to how to be more energy efficient in your kitchen. They'll also demonstrate how to make the most of leftovers and explore composting your food waste and recycling.

The Sustainable Bristol Festival will take place under the watchful eye of the RSA WEEE man – an amazing seven metre tall, 3.3 tonnes robotic figure made from old televisions, mobile phones and washing machines. The sculpture represents the amount of Waste Electronic and Electrical Equipment (WEEE) that one average person in the UK throws away in their lifetime.

Councillor Gary Hopkins, Executive member for Sustainable Environments and Neighbourhoods, Bristol City Council said,

'This event is a must for anyone who cares about the environment. Thanks to everyone who has worked so hard to put this event together. There is plenty going on over the weekend, and the wide variety of exhibits and activities, are sure to engage visitors of all ages with important issues around waste.

He continued: "There is a serious message behind this event we would like people to take away with them. That is - We must all take action now, or pay for it later."

Waste Facts:

- The UK produces more that 434 millions tonnes of waste every year. This rate of rubbish generation would fill the Albert Hall in London in less than 2 hours. (source: Waste Online)
- Every year UK households throw away the equivilant of 3 million double-decker buses (almost 330 million tonnes), a queue of which would stretch from London to Sydney and back. (Source: Waste Online)
- On average, each person in the UK, throws away seven times their body weight (about 500kg) in rubbish every year. (Source: Waste Online)
- The average UK citizen produces 3.3. tonnes of electrical waste every year, equivalent to the weight of 626 Clifton Suspension Bridges. (Source: RSA WEEE Man Project/The Clifton Suspension Bridge Trust)
- The 6 million tonnes of waste electrical and electronic equipment (WEE) disposed in Europe in 1998 consisted of an estimated 3.6 million tonnes of metal, 1.2 million tonnes of plastic, up to 27,000 tonnes of lead and 8 tonnes of mercury. (Source: AEA Technology)
- In the UK there are more than 15 billion electrical and electronic appliances, an average of 25 per householders and, at present, 90% of the electrical waste ends up in landfill sites. (Source: Royal Statistical Association)
